Exercise (10 minutes)</b></p> <p>Group Activity:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Divide students into small groups and assign each group one of the stakeholder groups: School, Street Committee, Health Centre, Panchayat, or SHGs.</li></ul>
<b>Closure</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Summarize the key points discussed, emphasizing the importance of stakeholder collaboration in community development.</li><li>2. Encourage students to consider how these stakeholders can work together in future programs for more holistic and sustainable outcomes.</li><li>3. Discuss how engaging multiple stakeholders in a community project increases the chances of its success.</li></ol>
<b>Evaluation</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Reflective Questions (What, Why, Who?). Allow students to answer and discuss.</li><li>2. Student Assessment: Spend the final 5 minutes discussing these questions and evaluating student understanding through a quick Q&amp;A session.</li></ol>
