



<b>Lesson Plan No. 0</b>	<b>Course Name: Law of Torts including MV &amp; CP Act</b> <b>Topic: Introduction to the Subject of Torts</b>	<b>Course No.: BBALLB-203</b>
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<b>Objectives</b>	At the end of the lesson the student shall be able to: a. Relate the relevance of studying Law of Torts. b. Differentiate between torts and other branches of law, such as contract law and criminal law. c. Analyze the essential elements of a tort and its significance in the legal system. d. Evaluate the role of tort law in providing remedies for civil wrongs and protecting individual rights.

<b>Teaching Development</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. <b>Introduction (5 minutes)</b><ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Begin with engaging questions: Have you ever heard of someone suing another person for damages? Can you think of any situations where someone was harmed due to another's actions?</li><li>- Provide a brief overview of the lesson, highlighting the importance of understanding tort law in everyday life.</li><li>- Define the term "tort" and its origin (from the Latin word "tortum", meaning twisted or wrong).</li></ul></li><li>2. <b>Lecture / Discussion (35 minutes)</b><ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>a. Relevance of subject<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Explain the relevance of studying Law of Torts by relating it with real-world examples to make students get a grasp of the subject domain.</li></ul></li><li>b. Historical perspective of Law of Torts.<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Discuss the historical evolution of Law of Torts by identifying in its origin under Hindu Law, Muslim Law and English Law.</li></ul></li><li>c. Introduction<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Begin with a discussion about laws and legal concepts students might already be familiar with.</li><li>- Mention the importance of civil law in resolving disputes.</li><li>- Introduce the concept of torts and explain that they are civil wrongs that can result in liability.</li><li>- Explain the concepts of justice, equity and good conscience.</li></ul></li><li>d. Definition and Scope of Tort Law<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Explain tort as a civil wrong that results in harm or loss, leading to legal liability.</li></ul></li></ol></li></ol>



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Differentiate tort law from criminal law (state vs. individual disputes) and contract law (breach of agreement vs. civil wrongs).</li><li>e. Types of Torts<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Intentional Torts - Assault, battery, false imprisonment, defamation, trespass.</li><li>- Negligence - Duty of care, breach, causation, and damage.</li><li>- Strict and Absolute Liability - No-fault liability (Rylands v. Fletcher).</li></ul></li><li>f. Significance of Tort Law<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Role of tort law in protecting personal rights, property, and reputation.</li><li>- Compensation for damages as a key feature.</li><li>- The evolving nature of tort law with technological and societal changes.</li></ul></li></ul> <p>3. <b>Exercise (5 Minutes)</b> Present students with a hypothetical scenario: A pedestrian is injured by a falling object from a construction site. Who is liable? Ask students to identify the type of tort involved and analyze the legal issues.</p>
